

Called Church Conference: Final Disaffiliation Vote



Dr. Stephen Cook, our District Superintendent, has scheduled a Called Church Conference at **6 p.m. Wednesday, January 11**, for the sole purpose of voting on Disaffiliation from the United Methodist Church.

This will be a congregational meeting held in the sanctuary, and every full member of the church will be eligible to vote. **Only those who are physically present will be allowed to vote.** There will be no absentee ballots or voting proxy for another. So, your attendance is important.

This is the final and binding vote on whether or not to disaffiliate from the UMC. There will be no second vote or revote. It will be a secret written ballot; however, you may be asked to sign your ballot to verify its authenticity.

Also, there will be a check-in process before the meeting. You will be asked to **sign** in at the **registration table** to verify that you are a full member and then receive your ballot. So, it will be very important to arrive early to the meeting so that you can sign in.

Disaffiliation Process

For a Disaffiliation Vote to pass it requires a **two-thirds majority** (**66.7%**) of all full church members present and voting at a duly called church conference. However, even if it passes, it still has to receive a simple majority (51%) approval at Annual Conference in June 2023.

The Disaffiliation Agreement would then be finalized on June 30, 2023. The Disaffiliation Payment of \$266,467 would be made at that time. And the church would begin operations as something other than United Methodist on July 1, 2023.

Every other arrangement of marriage runs counter to what God has commanded as well as to how God created us.

Faithfulness:

We are called to be faithful to the Word of God and to be faithful to our covenant within the Church, as expressed in the United Methodist Book of Discipline, so long as it is in agreement with what the Bible teaches.

One of the challenges in the current United Methodist Church is that not only are many bishops, pastors, and churches disobeying God's Word in the Bible, they are also disobeying church teaching in the Book of Discipline. They are breaking the covenant we all made to be faithful.

General Conference 2024

It is widely expected that the General Conference in 2024 will change the definition of marriage and the standards for ordination within the United Methodist Church.

Those two things only require a simple majority vote. And the votes have moved in that direction. This is partly due to the changing delegate count for 2024. With each of the departing churches in 2022 and 2023, there are lay and clergy delegates to General Conference who are leaving with them.

So, in the Texas Conference (Houston) 294 churches disaffiliated in December 2022. In the Northwest Texas Conference 145 out of 201 congregations voted to leave. In North Carolina 249 disaffiliated in November. And recently in the North Alabama Conference 198 churches all voted to leave.

Many of those represent traditional, conservative delegates to General Conference who will not be there in 2024. There replacements are centrist at best and liberal at worst.

Current estimates are that the **progressives have a simple majority** and intend to use it at General Conference. As one progressive delegate put it to encourage his followers, "Get ready! The progressive wave is coming!"

Our Response to LGBT
