How We Got Here: UMC Update

On **Tuesday, October 25, at 6 p.m.** we will have a **Disaffiliation Information Meeting** with Dr. Stephen Cook, our District Superintendent, and David Stotts, our Conference Treasurer. Currently, there are around 160 churches in the Mississippi Annual Conference who are exploring disaffiliation. That raises the question: Why are so many churches exploring disaffiliation? How did we get here? So, here's a brief review:

General Conference 2016: A proposal was made to table all legislation on marriage and human sexuality and to empower the Council of Bishops to form a committee to draft a plan and present it at a future special called session of General Conference.

This committee became the Commission on a Way Forward, and they proposed the **One Church Plan** which would have changed the definition of marriage from one man and one woman to two consenting adults and would have allowed each pastor and church to decide whether they would preside over and host same-sex weddings.

Western Jurisdictional Conference 2016: In July of 2016, the Western Jurisdiction elected Rev. Karen Oliveto as bishop. Rev. Oliveto is an open practicing lesbian married to another woman. Her election was appealed to the Judicial Council, who ruled she should not have been eligible and sent it back to the Western Jurisdiction to remove her. They refused, and she is still an active bishop.

Called General Conference 2019: This was a special called session that was supposed to resolve our differences over human sexuality once and for all. While the Council of Bishops promoted the One Church Plan, the delegates passed the **Traditional Plan**, which reaffirmed and strengthened our current Book of Discipline. It passed by a mere 54 votes. Immediately, many progressives and centrists said it was untenable and that they would not abide by it. Tensions increased as a result.

Protocol for Separation 2020: In the aftermath of 2019, Bishop Yambasu of Sierra Leone gathered leaders from all the major advocacy groups: progressive, centrist, and traditional. With the help of Kenneth Feinberg, a professional mediator, they drafted a proposal for an amicable separation of the UMC called the **Protocol of Reconciliation and Grace through Separation.** It was an imperfect compromise that would have created a new traditional, conservative Methodist denomination and given

the remainder of the UMC to the progressives and centrists. All groups promised to support and promote it, and it was widely expected to pass at General Conference 2020.

General Conference 2020: This was supposed to meet in May of 2020. But then, COVID happened. In March of 2020, the Commission on General Conference postponed the meeting until August/September 2021. Then, in 2021 they postponed it again until August/September 2022.

On March 3, 2022, the Commission announced that they were postponing the General Conference yet again. This time from 2022 to May 2024, which would be the next regularly scheduled GC. They said this due to lingering concerns over COVID, vaccinations, and passport/visa issues for global delegates. However, many objected that every other major group was able to meet (like the Anglican Lambeth Conference in England), so why not the UMC?

Global Methodist Church: On May 1, 2022, the Global Methodist Church launched. This was supposed to be the traditional Methodist denomination formed as part of the Protocol for Separation. Because of the further delay of General Conference to 2024 and the growing list of bishops ignoring the Book of Discipline, the leaders of the GMC decided to go ahead and start the new denomination.

Judicial Council: This is our equivalent of the Supreme Court. They made two key rulings recently. First, since so many bishops are needing to retire, they ruled that the Council of Bishops may convene the needed Jurisdictional Conferences to meet this November 2-4, 2022 to elect new bishops. Our own Bishop Swanson retires this year, and we will receive a new bishop as of January 2023.

Second, they ruled that Annual Conferences may not withdraw as a whole from the UMC, whether to be independent or join with another denomination. Technically, they said that Conferences have the right to vote to withdraw, but not the right to act on what they voted. This was after the Bulgarian Annual Conference voted to withdraw from the UMC and join the Global Methodist Church.

Disaffiliation Clause 2553: This was a path of exit from the UMC approved at the 2019 Called General Conference. It was proposed by a Centrist delegate (Taylor), anticipating that many progressives wouldn't want to stay in a traditional UMC.

Ironically, since that time, it has become the primary means of exit for traditional churches that don't want to remain in an increasingly progressive UMC. It requires a payment of 2 years apportionments and the church's share of the unfunded pension liability. It also requires a 2/3 majority vote of all members present at a Church Conference convened by the DS, and a majority vote of the Annual Conference.

Status of the Protocol: In June 2022, five of the Centrist and Progressive leaders who helped negotiate the Protocol for Separation withdrew their support and said they would not vote for it any longer. Many have taken that to mean that progressives and centrists are unlikely to ever vote for the Protocol. So, you may hear the line "The Protocol is dead."

As you can see, a lot's happened in just a few short years. Hopefully, this gives some background to what is going on and how we got here. As we await our meeting with the DS on October 25, I encourage you to pray for God to lead and guide us in His paths. In all things, may we glorify Him.
