

The Scandal of the Cross

"For the message of the Cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God." - 1 Corinthians 1:18

Nearly two thousand years later it is hard for us to fully appreciate how offensive and strange the cross must have seemed to first-century Christians.

We wear cross jewelry. We fashion beautiful necklaces and earrings with little silver or gold crosses. We place intricately hand-carved crosses on the walls of our homes. We put large golden and wooden crosses up on our church altar for all to see. In short, we've often turned the cross into a beautiful work of art.

But not so in those early days of the Christian faith. In the first century the cross was ugly and brutal, bloodstained and shameful. It was a means of torture and death for only the worst of criminals and the most scandalous of political enemies. To admit that you knew someone executed on a cross was embarrassing, a source of shame.

So, it was hard for a non-Christian back then to appreciate how we as Christians could glory in that shame. It seemed like foolishness. There was a scandal to the Cross.

Only one thing changed that. You and I know that the Cross is the source of our salvation. Jesus' death provides the atoning sacrifice for our sin, and we receive the forgiveness of sin through His shed blood. So, where they see shame, we see glory. Where they see scandal, we see the power of God's saving grace. May we ever glory in the Cross of Christ, the means of our salvation.
